

ALBERTA'S INDUSTRIAL HEARTLAND AREA STRUCTURE PLAN UPDATE TIMELINE

Phase 1

Fall 2016

- Initial outreach to stakeholders
- Understanding the current reality of the AIH ASP area

Phase 2

Fall 2016

- Public Engagement Event #1:
 - Confirming opportunities and constraints
- Develop vision as well as draft concepts

Phase 3

Winter/Spring 2017

- Presenting the draft development concept and gather feedback
- Public Engagement Events
 - March 2 Open House
 - April 26 Information Session with Landowners
- Prepare draft ASP

Summer 2017

- Public Engagement Event #3:
 - Presenting the finalized draft ASP

Phase 4

Late 2017

 Present final ASP at Public Hearing for Council consideration





WHAT WE HEARD / WHAT WE DID ALBERTA'S INDUSTRIAL HEARTLAND AREA STRUCTURE PLAN UPDATE

What We Heard

- > ASP should reflect the economy and growth potential
- Light or Medium Industrial use may be more feasible than Heavy Industrial use
- Maintain Agriculture Policy Area at the North and South sides of the ASP
- Do not increase Heavy Industrial Policy Area
- Existing Provincial Recreation Area can be identified as such
- Existing creeks can be identified as such
- Remove Natural Priority Area ("green blob")

Align ASP with other adjacent Municipal Industrial Heartland ASPs

What We Did

- ✓ Decreased Heavy Industrial Policy Area
- ✓ Created new Policy Areas:
 - Light/Medium Industrial/Highway Commercial
 - Agriculture Industrial
- ✓ Identified existing Institutional (church) sites
- ✓ Identified existing creeks
- ✓ Identified existing North Bruderheim Recreational Area

- Recommend updates to Land Use Bylaw Heartland Zoning Districts
- ✓ Consider allowing secondary dwellings/structures as a discretionary use in the Land Use Districts
- ✓ Agriculture buffer area adjacent to Strathcona County replaced with Light/Medium Industrial/Highway Commercial Policy Area
